The Library’s Commitment to You

This Year: Library staff offered activities that promote reading for everyone—from newborns to those who are housebound. We launched an online community calendar as a one-stop resource for information about meetings and events held by area non-profits and clubs. And, thanks to Senator Neil Breslin, we purchased new furniture for our public computers.

Preparation for enhancing our programs and services and evaluating the building continued. Our efforts in this area included assessing community needs and identifying the legal and state resources available to us. We also met with an architect and engineer to discuss the current condition of the building and consider how to finance necessary building repairs and possible expansion.

The Future: We would like to increase the number of special programs we offer and to expand our efforts with both seniors and teens. We plan to maintain our collections while enhancing our electronic services. This year we hope to develop a building program and begin design and development activities. Budget: The new budget adds both librarian and support staff while maintaining our collection size. As a consequence, it is 7% higher than last year’s, resulting in an estimated increase of \$0.12 for each \$1,000 of your assessment.
